Course Objectives:

Elective Papers:

HIS-101- History of India Upto the Mauryas

The Objective of this course is to highlight the main trends and developments from the Pre-historic period to the Mauryan Period of Ancient India. The students will get acquainted with the various socio-cultural, religious, political and economic developments of the period that will eventually change the course of Indian History.

HIS-201: History of India (Post Maurya to Delhi Sultanate)

This course is to introduce students to the elements of change and continuity in Indian history with special reference to social, economic, political, art and cultural developments from the post Mauryas times to Delhi Sultanate.

HIS-301: History of India (1526 to the 19th Century)

The students will understand and estimate the rise of the Mughal Empire in India. They will learn about the colonial expansion of British in the 19th Century India. The course also emphasis

on society, economy and religious condition of India between 16th and 19th Century, and the rise of new socio-religious ideologies during the colonial rule.

HIS-401-Indian Nationalism

The objective of this course is to impart the students the significance of the Freedom Struggle movement, the role of various nationalist leaders and important political, socio-cultural trends and development leading to India gaining Independence from British Colonialism.

HIS- 501: History of Europe

This course is to introduce students to some of the major developments in the world about the decline of the feudalism and the rise of modern era, renaissance, reformation, rise of absolutist state, revolutions etc.

HIS-601: Modern World

The students will learn about the rise and fall of different nations. They will become familiar with colonialism, liberalism and decolonization. They will learn about divergent national movements and rise of different ideologies. They will study the two World Wars and the aftermath effects.

Honour Papers:

HIS-102 (History of North-East 1822-1972)

The objective of this course is to inculcate the students the impact of the British rule and policies on the tribal communities of North-East region and the reorganization of North-Eastern States from 1822 to 1972.

HIS- 202A: East Asia (1840-1950)

The objective of this course is to present an overview of the political, socio-economic developments, European expansion and the consequential nationalistic movements in the East Asia: China, Japan and Korea.

HIS-302: History of India (c.A.D. 1550-1750)

The students will enhance knowledge on Mughal historians and their contributions towards historiography. They will learn on social, political and economic condition of India during the Mughal period. Rise of new religion and cultural development will also be studied.

HIS-402-(History of the United States of America)

The objective of this course is to familiarize the students with colonization of America, the political, economic and mercantile policies implemented by Great Britain, American Civil War, Making of the Constitution, foreign policies and America emerging as an Imperialist power leading to the II World War.

HIS-502: History of Christianity in Nagaland (1813-1972)

Students will get broad understanding of the pre-colonial Naga society and religion. They will also learn about the advent of Christianity and its impact on the Nagas.

HIS- 503: Social and Economic History of Modern India (18th - 20th Century)

This course provides students to analyze the pre-colonial society and economic conditions. They acquire knowledge on social changes and economic developments in modern India.

HIS-602: Political History of the Nagas

The course will make the students aware of the nature and structure of the traditional Naga polity. They will understand and analyze the coming of British into the Naga Hills. The students will also learn about the rise of Naga Nationalism.

HIS- 603B: Introduction to Archaeology

The course gives a glimpse to gain strong background in the ancient history to the nature of archaeological data, its method and the multidisciplinary approaches to the study of past societies. This course explains the basic concepts, field method, reconstruction and interpretation of evidence in archaeology. They will also learn the establishment of archaeology in India.
