Certain follow up activities were conducted and organized such as Helped to make a study time table and was asked to follow up as daily routine. Followed them up every semester, gave task to make new friends and communicate with new people, Consoled and advise them, Helped them in sorting out by inspiring them about various successful people.

Mentoring session for 2019 batch had been conducted once in every semester but the mentees were being followed up by the respective mentor consistently. The mentoring session had been conducted in two ways. The first method is having session in groups and the second method is to have an interactive session with the mentees personally. During the group session, the mentees were briefed about the whole mentoring process and during the interactive session the mentees were made to open up about their personal life and academic career.

## Issues raised/discussed:

During the mentoring session, issues were discussed in two categories concerning the mentees- personal life and academics. With regard to personal life, the mentees can share their personal and family problems which affects their personal life as well as their career. Issues covering their health status, attitudes and approach towards fellow persons and the society leading them to lack of confidence, isolated and undisclosed nature etc. are thoroughly discussed.

In Academics, issues concerning students lack of interest in particular subjects are discussed. Difficulties and problems such as class follow up, irregularities, complicated papers, attendance etc. are discussed personally with the mentee. Slow learners are marked carefully and they are monitored effectively.

## Issues resolved:

Issues concerning personal life were being addressed by counselling them through the mentor life experiences, or any other effective means. Under academics, their problems and difficulties on particular papers were addressed to the concerned teacher. The teachers uses different methods and strategies to make it comprehended. Attendance of irregular students are strictly followed up by contacting their parents/guardians and discussed before them. Slow learners are monitored carefully and consistently by giving time and selective assignments for them to work.

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#### **Mentoring Report**

The mentoring programme for 2019 batch started through a well structured mentor-mentee system developed in the college. I was assigned 18(eighteen) students as mentees. However, 2(two) left the college for pursuing their goals in other fields. My mentees were of both the gender – 10(ten) females and 6(six) males. The mentoring sessions were conducted at two levels - in groups and through one-to-one interaction. I prepared the list of students/mentees allotted. Mentees were provided "Mentoring Book" where they wrote all their personal and educational information. All the data/information provided by the mentees is kept confidential. This enabled the mentor-mentee establishing a trustworthy relationship. With the help of the information provided by the mentees, weak areas of the mentees were identified and were closely monitored. Since the mentoring session for this batch is for a period of three years, it is still continuing.

# Report on mentoring – 2019-22 batch

In the mentoring session of 2019-22 batch 18 mentees were assigned. Usually mentoring session is conducted right after the academic session starts and end of the semester. Mentoring was mostly conducted in one to one session and hardly any group session was conducted as the mentees preferred one to one session. In most cases during the mentoring session mentees come with the issues likes relationship, family, gaming, mobile addiction, poor communication skill, shyness, lack of concentration power, poor in studies and so on. As a mentor I tried to get to know their weakness and strength of my mentees and efforts are being made on both side to work on the weakness and resolve the various issues they are facing. The vitality of mentoring was clearly visible in their performance during exams.

The first mentoring session of 2020 was held in the month of August through telephonic conversation, out of 18 mentees, most of them are in Kohima while few in their home town. Each mentees were asked to highlight the various problems they are facing in online classes during this Lockdown period. Most of the mentees said that they have connectivity problems. Some of the problems they shared during online classes: unable to adapt to the new learning system, unable to concentrate for long due to fluctuation in network or connectivity, easily gets distracted, difficult to cope up with the lesson as some teachers are too fast, creating a gap between students and teachers etc. As a mentor, I am trying my best to look into their problems to come out with a better solution.

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## Mentoring Report: 2019 - 2020

#### **Report:**

Mentoring is a relationship between two people with the goal of professional and personal development. There are eighteen (18) students as the mentees belonging to the batch of 2019 -2022 as supervised by the staff in charge. The various mentoring sessions were held for the BA students during the academic year 2019 - 2020. The students were cooperative in attending the various sessions it was beneficial for them to learn from their mentor. During the mentoring sessions different important areas were discussed in guiding the students for the growth of their future. Some of them are the good qualities they have, the interest areas and the aspects they want to change. The academic and personal matters were discussed where the students share about their problems and difficulties they faced as student. The mentees open up their personal matters where the mentor as guide provides counseling to the mentees. Some of the students also share their problems they face in their studies. Some remedial programmes like writing the past question papers, making notes and preparing schedules for their study were initiated to do well in their studies. The mentor make available the tips and skills to improve their studies. They are instructed to do well in their internal assessment and also in the external examinations to make improvements in their studies. Thus, the mentees are instructed to attend classes regularly and perform well in their exams for the success in their lives. The students were happy about the mentoring programmes organized by the Mentoring Committee, Don Bosco College, Kohima.

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## **Report on Mentoring (2019)**

Name of the Mentor:

Tsutshowe-ü Sekhamo Assistant Professor (Department of History)

At present Tsutshowe-ü Sekhamo is mentoring 19 mentees from Batch 2019. In the first session all the mentees will gather in prearranged classroom and was briefed on the purpose of mentoring sessions. Each was handed a mentoring book and detailed explanation was given on its maintenance. The following sessions were conducted based on one on one meet.

Mentees are prompted with open ended questions so that they open up and discuss on both academic and personal issues. Some mentees are hesitant at first but when encouraged they slowly open up and share their thoughts. Most problems the mentees face are related to their grades, family issues, incapability to speak in public and indecisive future plans.

Based on their problems, the mentees were asked to take up certain challenges. Follow up was done in the following session and if required mentees were contacted during off session hours. Third one on one session was conducted through Google Meet, WhatsApp and Phone Calls due to the ongoing Pandemic. Final results could not be assessed at present since more sessions are yet to be conducted with the current batch. But so far the results shown are positive and the mentees are more open in the sessions.



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## Report on Mentoring (Batch 2019)

**Number of Mentees:** 18 (Eighteen) **Brief Report:** In the Mentoring Sessions of Batch 2019 eighteen students were assigned to staff-incharge Dr. Pinky Sagolsem as their Mentor for the duration of their course programme. For this batch of students two mentoring sessions were conducted for the academic session 2019-2020. The first one was conducted on 15<sup>th</sup> - 17<sup>th</sup> June 2019, and the second mentoring session was conducted on 14<sup>th</sup> -17<sup>th</sup> February 2020. Mentoring sessions were conducted in groups at times but most sessions were done one-to-one. In the first mentoring session, the focused was on making the students aware of the benefits of the mentoring. Information on keeping the mentoring book was also shared. In one to one mentoring sessions the Mentor tried to form a bond with the mentee and thereby to make them comfortable to open up. ## A brief report on the completion of 1 year mentoring i.e., 2019-2020

18 students were assigned to Mrs. Kezienuo as their mentor for 3 years of the study in the college. ## **Mentoring Report**

The first mentoring session for the year 2019 was conducted in the month of January. The mentoring for each batch lasted for 3 days. The schedule followed for the mentoring session was given below:

1. 16<sup>th</sup> -18<sup>th</sup> January: Mentoring for 6<sup>th</sup> Semester Students

2. 21st -23rd January: Mentoring for 4th Semester Students

3. 24<sup>th</sup>- 28<sup>th</sup> January: Mentoring for 2<sup>nd</sup> Semester Students

During the mentoring the mentor focused on the issues relating to both the mentee's academic as well as personal aspects. The teachers' tried their best to motivate and discuss their academic and personal concerns. Almost all the students turned up for the session.

## **Mentoring Report**

The second mentoring session for the year 2019 was conducted in the month of June and July. The schedule followed for the mentoring session was given below:

Mentoring for 1<sup>st</sup> Semester Students (15<sup>th</sup>-17<sup>th</sup> June): The respective mentors were given 17 mentees each. Since it was their first time with their mentor they did not open up much. They were told to fill up the mentoring book and submit it to their respective mentor on time.

Mentoring for 3<sup>rd</sup> Semester Students was supposed to be from 18<sup>th -</sup> 20<sup>th</sup> June but it was continued till the 24<sup>th</sup> of June. It was because most of the 3<sup>rd</sup> semester students were participating and helping in the preparation of the Freshers' Party which was conducted on 21<sup>st</sup> of June.

The same was the case for the Mentoring for  $5^{th}$  Semester Students. The schedule for mentoring for the  $5^{th}$  semester was from 24th-  $26^{th}$  June but because of some programme in the college the students were busy. So the mentoring continued till  $3^{rd}$  of July.

The mentors submitted the list of absentees during the mentoring programme on the last day of the mentoring session.

By this time of mentoring most of the  $3^{rd}$  and  $5^{th}$  semester students were opening up and a bond between the mentor and mentee could be formed.

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
