1. Answer the following questions : 10×4=40

(a) (i) How does Yeats explore the relationship between old age and art in the poem, *Sailing to Byzantium*?

Or

(ii) How does *The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock* reflect the predicament of the modern man?

(b) (i) Elaborate on the symbols used in *September 1, 1939*.

Or

(ii) Give a critical analysis of *Fern Hill* as a poem filled with intensely lyrical language and rich metaphorical descriptions.

(c) (i) Bring out the biographical elements in Kamala Das' poem, *An Introduction*.

Or

(ii) Examine the tension between lust and restraint in the poem, *Still another View of Grace*.

2. Read the following passage and paraphrase it in your own words : 14

“Honesty is telling the truth to other people, and integrity is telling the truth to myself.” This famous saying describes integrity
